### Pause and Ponder

November/December – Jesus Heals an Invalid at Bethesda (John 5:1-15) Virtuous Action – Helping Others in Need

Reread the healing described in our Gospel this month. A few items of interest emerge. First, notice that Jesus doesn't comment on the man's faith or lack of faith prior to or after the healing. The man shows no sign of faith in Jesus. Apparently, Jesus' healing depends on neither the quality nor quantity of the person's faith.

Second, doesn't it seem strange, especially in this month with Thanksgiving on our minds, that the healed man expressed no gratitude to Jesus? Unlike other passages in Scripture where a person who has been blessed in some way announces what the Lord has done for him, the healed man tries to divest himself from Jesus, if we read further in the passage. Apparently, Jesus actions are freely given with or without gratitude from the recipient.

Finally, with all of the people sitting around the pool at Bethesda, Jesus selected this one man from among many to be healed. Why him? No reason is given in the Scripture passage. Apparently, Jesus doesn't have pre-requisites in determining who will receive the healing gift.

The bottom line is Jesus welcomes us however we are – with or without faith, with or without gratitude, with or without any special characteristics. He accepts us as we are. What a relief for us! This week, let's pause a few times to think about this great gift that Jesus gives us.

# **Catholic Identity**

**Advent** – With a few weeks remaining before the start of Advent (December 1), schools are encouraged to review the school-wide plan for this season which begins the new liturgical year.

• **Theme:** Is there a unified theme that will be present throughout the classrooms and school? Examples would be "Watch and Wait" or "Maranatha – Come Lord Jesus."

- *Image:* Is there a single image (photo, artwork, etc.) that will be visible in the classrooms and throughout the school connected to the theme?
- **Advent Wreath:** Will this traditional symbol be prominent in the school lobby or other site where people gather? Perhaps the Jesse Tree may be appropriate for older students?
- *Prayer:* Will the school community pray together daily or weekly utilizing the Advent wreath and/or the Jesse Tree??
- Worship: Will the school community celebrate special Advent days in some way (St. Nicholas, Immaculate Conception, Our Lady of Guadalupe, St. Lucy)?
- Service: Will a particular service activity be planned to expand students' understanding and action?
- **Environment**: Will the school community celebrate Advent not Christmas? Perhaps Christmas decorations could be held off until the week of December 15 which begins with Gaudette Sunday?

If we expect students to understand and appreciate Advent at all grade levels, then through our message, community, worship, and service, the tone of Advent must ring clear in our Catholic schools.
