Pause and Ponder

September – Jesus Turns Water into Wine at the Wedding at Cana (John 2:1-11) Virtuous Action – Listen Responsibly

We know from the Gospel of Saint John that the only people who knew how the water turned to wine were the servers at the wedding. They had drawn the water to fill the six stone water jars (comparable to the size of six large trash cans). They were certain that only water filled the containers.

Imagine their amazement when they realized what had occurred. "Incredulous" hardly captures how they must have felt. These witnesses to the first public miracle of Jesus speak nothing in the Gospel passage, but surely they were not closed-mouthed about the event with family and friends. Wouldn't we be telling everyone far and wide about what we had witnessed, if we were in their sandals?

Each day we see remarkable happenings in our schools by staff and students. Their "heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another" (Col 3:12-13) are daily miracles. We witness the glory of God in our school communities.

This week, let us act as the servers probably did in the Gospel after experiencing a miracle. Let us acknowledge to others their goodness and thank them for being in our lives.

Attention Needed

NEW Employment Posting Procedures — In restructuring our employment posting process a **NEW Employment Posting Google Form** has been created to streamline the process. This new form can be found on the CSO intranet under Personnel Resources — Hiring Needs. If someone on your staff is responsible for submitting employment posting requests, be sure s/he is informed of this new process.

New Teacher Reports for Late Hires – Please be sure a New Teacher Report has been submitted for all new teachers, especially those hired after New Teacher Orientation on August 15. It is imperative for the planning of Initial Faith Formation and mentoring and the integrity of the permanent personnel records.

Pre-employment Drug Testing for New School Employees – As a reminder, all new school employees must complete pre-employment drug testing and receive clearance from the diocesan Human Resources Office before beginning employment. This is important to remember when filling unexpected last minute vacancies.

School Religion Leaders' Meeting – Please remind your School Religion Leader (Curriculum Coordinator or Department Chair) about the meeting on **Wednesday, October 2**, at the Catholic Schools Office. Elementary Coordinators will meet 1:00 – 3:00 pm; Secondary Chairpersons will meet 2:00 – 4:00 pm. From 2:00-3:00 pm a presentation will occur for all School Religion Leaders – elementary and secondary. Please remind your School Religion Leader about this annual meeting.

Level Coordinators' Meetings – Elementary Principals are asked to share the following dates with level coordinators so they can attend their annual meetings. All meetings are at the Catholic Schools Office beginning at 1:00 pm.

- Middle School Level Tuesday, October 1
- Intermediate Level Tuesday, October 8
- Primary Level Tuesday, October 15
- Early Childhood Thursday, October 24

High School Admissions Process – Beginning this year the High School Admissions Process will parallel the college level admissions process. High schools will be requesting parents or guardians to upload the following requested items for admissions consideration:

- Final grades for Grades 6-7
- Trimester 1 grades for Grade 8
- Renaissance Longitudinal Report for Reading and Math

The Confidential Recommendation Form will continue to be submitted *only* by the elementary school *directly* to the high school, when requested by the high school.

Since you will receive requests from parents for this information, you may wish to consider preparing one student packet for each child applying to any of the eight Catholic high schools (parish, diocesan, private) in the Diocese of Wilmington so that the parent or guardian has the information needed without interrupting the work of the school office multiple times for this information. The Confidential Recommendation Form is not included in the student packet.

Newsworthy Information

Facts about Catholic schools...

- 99% of students who attend Catholic high school graduate. Of those, 86% attend 4-year colleges. (NCEA)
- The minority population accounts for 19.8% of the Catholic school population (15% Latino; 8% Black/African American; 5% Asian American; 5.6% Multiracial). (NCEA)
- Catholic schools provide over 24 billion dollars a year in savings for the nation. (NCEA)
- Graduates of Catholic high schools are more likely to vote. (Cohen & Chafee, 2012)
- Catholic school graduates enjoy higher earning potential than public school graduates. (Neal, 1997, p. 108; Owyang, and Vermann, 2012, p. 4)

Reasons to Celebrate

50th **Anniversary Celebration** – **Saint Mark's High School** opened its golden jubilee year with Mass celebrated by Bishop Malooly and a number of concelebrants on Friday, September 6. The presence of former administrators and teachers, along with parent, board, and benefactor participants, created a welcoming spirit to the occasion and the start of the new school year.

Blessing of School Expansion – Christ the Teacher Catholic School dedicated its new classrooms and gymnasium on Sunday, September 8. More than 700 guests were present as Bishop Malooly blessed the cornerstone, classroom, and gymnasium. The additional classrooms have allowed the school to expand its enrollment to 624 students.
