Pause and Ponder

Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Very appropriate to the start of Lent on Wednesday, February 14, our next Beatitude to consider focuses on mercy. Similar to the wording found in the Our Father, where we pray, "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us," this Beatitude has the same ring to it. The blessing of mercy we shall receive is contingent upon the mercy we give to others.

But what does it mean to be merciful? Is it a forgetting of the wrong or the hurt incurred? Certainly not. When one is injured in some way – physically, emotionally, or spiritually, the hurt remains in some form. After all, even in his resurrected state, Jesus bore the wounds of the injury he received.

Mercy, however, is compassion or forgiveness shown toward someone whom it is within one's power to punish or harm. It is a deliberate act of kindness given to another person, one who sometimes regrets words spoken or actions taken or words or actions withheld.

Among the many blessings we can extend to others, mercy stands at the forefront. This week, as we reflect on our Lenten intentions, perhaps a commitment to acts of mercy throughout the penitential season will be the greatest gift we can give others and ourselves.

Catholic Identity - National Marriage Week - February 7-14



The observances of National Marriage Week (February 7-14) and World Marriage Day (Sunday, February 11) are an opportunity to focus on building a culture of life and love that begins with supporting and promoting marriage and the family. The theme for 2024 is "Love Beyond Words."

During the week schools are asked to include an intention for married couples in prayer throughout the week. (Two possible intentions are found on page 1 under "Let Us Pray.") During the week or at another time this month would also be a time to discuss the vocation of the married life, to invite a married couple to reflect on the Sacrament of Matrimony, to learn more about the diocesan Pre-Cana program, or to send congratulations to a married or engaged couple.

While marriage may not fit into a particular curriculum unit, think of it as fitting into every curriculum unit for this Sacrament of Matrimony leads to children whom we educate. Taking time from one lesson to do something special connected to marriage, to share a personal, but appropriate story, to show wedding photos, or to answer student questions reinforces our value of this Sacrament.

Black History Month - February

Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month, which is an annual celebration of achievements by Black Americans and a time for recognizing the central role of Black people in U.S. history. The 2024 theme for Black History Month is "African Americans and the Arts." In 2024, we examine the varied history and life of African American arts and artisans. Throughout the month, in line with the 2024 theme, you may wish to consider featuring a Black American significant in the arts – music, drama, visual arts, or dance.

February is also a time to focus on Black Catholics. Here is a "Did You Know?" provided by Brenda Burns, Director of the Office for Black Catholics, Diocese of Wilmington.

Did you know that there are six African Americans known as the Saintly Six currently being considered for sainthood from all parts of country? There are four Venerables: Augustus Tolton (Chicago), Henriette DeLille (New Orleans), Pierre Tousaint (New York City), and Mother Mary Elizabeth Lange (Baltimore). There are two Servants of God: Julia Greeley (Denver) and Sr. Thea Bowman (Mississippi). The process of becoming a Saint starts with being declared a Servant of God, then made a Venerable, then beatified as a Blessed, and then canonized a Saint.



Teacher Observations/Walkthroughs and Summative Evaluations

Administrators should be well on the way in completing required observations and walkthroughs for teachers. Process is as important as product in this regard, so please be sure that the appropriate steps are followed in observations and walkthroughs. Documentation from these required observations and walkthroughs, along with data from additional observations, walkthroughs, lesson plan and assessment reviews, consideration of beyond-the-classroom expectations, etc. will provide information for the annual summative evaluation. *Summative evaluations should not be given to teachers prior to May 15.*

If administrators deem a future meeting is necessary, it will be scheduled.


Principal Position - St. Elizabeth High School

The position of Principal of St. Elizabeth High School with a start date of July 1, 2024 was posted on Thursday, February 1.

In accordance with CSO Policy 4120, if a current principal is interested in being considered for a transfer he/she must contact the Superintendent within ten days of the notification. At the same time, he/she must inform his/her current Pastor of the request. (If applicable, the principal must also notify the President/Board Chair.) Upon receiving the transfer request, the Superintendent will notify the hiring Pastor and, if designated, President and a determination of one of the following will be made:

- An interview will be granted to the current diocesan principal with the hiring Pastor and, if designated,
 President; if a transfer is deemed acceptable and agreed upon, the Principal Search Process is
 concluded.
- The current principal will be invited to participate in the full Principal Search Process with other candidates and will be granted an interview with the Principal Search Committee.

A current principal who applies for the vacancy after ten days, but before the deadline, will be interviewed with other candidates as part of the full search process.
