Pause and Ponder

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied.

Our virtue for January is justice. When questioned about the meaning of what is right and just, often times we hear the words "equal," "equitable," or "fair." This natural inclination to believe that what is given to all in the same manner provides a right and just solution may seem reasonable at first glance. However, when we reflect on the fourth Beatitude, the concept of what is right and just takes on a broader meaning.

In looking at how Jesus lived righteously, reflecting His Father's love and mercy, abundance, and perhaps overabundance, would be the apt description. Justice for Jesus wasn't measured out proportionally to each person. What was right and just, holy and good, merciful and caring was given in generosity and then some. Jesus wasn't dividing his care and concern so that all received equal, equitable, or fair proportions. He gave wholly and freely as much as was needed to whomever needed it.

This week, as we interact with others, let's redefine our understanding of righteous (just) acts as giving generously of ourselves to others without measure. In satisfying the hunger and thirst of others for justice, our overwhelming kindness, forgiveness, time, energy, etc. will help them and us come closer to imitating the right and just acts modeled for us by Jesus.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), no. 373, designates January 22 as a particular day of prayer and penance, called the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children." As individuals, we are called to observe this day through the penitential practices of prayer, fasting, and/or giving alms.

During the week of January 23, in conjunction with the Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children, all elementary and secondary schools are asked to incorporate a lesson, grade appropriate, in Religion classes specifically focused on the importance of life at all ages and stages. Vision for the Future Tuition Assistance Deadline – January 31 Final Month to Apply for 2024-2025

Applications and all required documentation for the 2024-2025 school year must be received by FACTS no later than *January 31, 2024*. Late or incomplete applications will not be considered.

Schools are asked to recommend that all student families apply for tuition assistance. This enables the Development Office to meet emergency needs that may arise during a school year. Often, a family will reach out to the Development Office when their circumstances change. The Development Office may only assist families if they have applied previously to FACTS.

2022 W2 statements are accepted. A family does not need to wait for the 2023 W2 statement.

Tuition assistance through the Diocese of Wilmington is provided to children attending Grades K-12.

Families currently receiving tuition assistance from the diocese must reapply. Assistance is not automatically renewed from year to year.

Award notifications will begin as of March 1, 2024.

Principal Position – Saint Mark's High School

The position of Principal of Saint Mark's High School with a start date of July 1, 2024 will be posted on Tuesday, January 16.

In accordance with Policy 4120 and the Principal Search Process for Diocesan Schools with a President, current Diocese of Wilmington principals interested in being considered for a transfer must contact the Superintendent within ten days of this notification. At the same time, he/she must inform his/her current Pastor of the request. Upon receiving the transfer request, the Superintendent will determine one of the following:

- An interview will be granted to the current Diocese of Wilmington principal with the Superintendent and President of the school and, if a transfer is deemed acceptable and agreed upon, the Principal Search Process is concluded.
- The current Diocese of Wilmington principal will be invited by the Superintendent and President of the school to participate in the full Principal Search Process with other candidates and will be granted an interview with the Principal Search Committee.

A current principal who applies for the vacancy after ten days, but before the deadline, will be interviewed with other candidates as part of the full search process.
