Pause and Ponder

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied.

The start of the new year brings with it a great challenge in the fourth Beatitude. We are called to strive for righteousness. Righteousness results in relationships that are just. In so many areas of our lives we face situations where injustice leads to all kinds of prejudices about which we hear, read, or experience – race, sex, age, ability, nationality, economics, social, and others.

The fourth Beatitude is very explicit in our call to justice. It is not only a desire, a hope, or a wish. We are not asked to think about justice or talk about justice. Reread the first part of the Beatitude. Those who are blessed "hunger" and "thirst" for righteousness (justice). It is written in the strongest language which must be felt in the depths of who we are. We must commit to justice with purpose and intensity.

As we move through this month, let us first become more cognizant of situations where we find ourselves that speak of a need for justice – large or small. Then, let us look for opportunities to begin to address a circumstance that requires our attention.

The fourth Beatitude doesn't call us to measure the grandeur of our actions. It simply asks us to root out the hurt that another experiences because we have been less than the people we should be – righteous.

Vision for the Future Tuition Assistance Final Month to Apply for 2024-2025

Applications and all required documentation for the 2024-2025 school year must be received by FACTS no later than January 31, 2024. Late or incomplete applications will not be considered.

Schools are asked to recommend that all student families apply for tuition assistance. This enables the Development Office to meet emergency needs that may arise during a school year. Often, a family will reach out to the Development Office when their circumstances change. The Development Office may only assist families if they have applied previously to FACTS.

2022 W2 statements are accepted. A family does not need to wait for the 2023 W2 statement.

Tuition assistance through the Diocese of Wilmington is provided to children attending Grades K-12.

Families currently receiving tuition assistance from the diocese must reapply. Assistance is not automatically renewed from year to year.

Award notifications will begin as of March 1, 2024.

Group Movie Licensing

It is important for schools to abide by copyright law when it comes to showing movies and educational films in group settings in our facilities. Christ the Teacher Catholic School will again be coordinating the movie licensing this year. Christian Video Licensing International (CVLI) covers over 1,000 movie studios, including major studios such as Disney, Pixar, Sony, Warner Brothers, 20th Century Fox, Paramount, along with the list found here: http://cvli.com/producers/total-package/. The license also covers streaming services when a teacher streams from their own account to a class, as long as the producer is found in the list linked above. (Netflix, Hulu, etc.).

Based on the enrollment of the schools which purchased a license last year, the licensing company quoted us *around* \$0.80 per student, if all of the same schools sign on.

<u>This year, the schools that were licensed last year will automatically renew.</u> If you are interested in removing yourself from the license or adding on to our group license, please e-mail Tina Gallagher (tgallagher@christtheteacher.org) no later than *Friday, January 12*. Invoices will be sent to schools by late January.
