Pause and Ponder

Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Each of us probably recalls the parable of the Good Samaritan, the story of a man robbed while travelling from Jerusalem to Jericho. Among the passersby, it was only the foreigner, the Samaritan, distained by the Jews, who stopped to assist the injured man. "He approached the victim, poured oil and wine over his wounds and bandaged them. Then he lifted him up on his own animal, took him to an inn, and cared for him (Luke 10:34)."

What does cleansing and binding wounds, carrying a wounded person and waiting on him imply? The ability to look at someone else's pain and brokenness, to share in his or her disfigurement, to "get messy," to become weighted down by his or her sorrow, and to disrupt one's own life for the other's needs.

Daily Prayer 2023

This Gospel selection and the description of extending comfort to one in need reinforces the second Beatitude. We touch the sorrow of sin when we get in the middle of a challenging situation and do what is right and just. When we take on the sacrifices required to meet the needs of another, then we become comfort bearers to the one who is hurting. Here's the invitation for us this week – to bring comfort to a person who feels hopeless or helpless in some way.

All Souls Day – November 2

"I believe... in the resurrection of the body and life everlasting." – These final words of the Apostles Creed gain our focus in November, the Month of the Holy Souls. We learn from the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* that faith in the resurrection of our bodies is inseparable from our faith in the Resurrection of Christ's body from the dead. He rose as our head, as the pattern of our rising, and as the life-giving source of our new life. All the dead will rise when Jesus comes again to judge the living and the dead. In the final resurrection, our bodies will be transformed, although we do not know precisely how. The manner of our resurrection exceeds our understanding and imagination and is accessible only by our faith.

United States Catholic Catechism for Adults

The Resurrection was one question on the ARK assessment that offered the opportunity for further development among our students. Spending time sharing the Gospel accounts of the resurrection, comparing and contrasting them, sets the stage for a conversation about our own resurrection from the dead, as affirmed in the Apostles and Nicene Creeds.

Perhaps praying the Apostles or Nicene Creed may be appropriate prayer during the month of November.
