Pause and Ponder

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land.

November ushers in the third Beatitude with its emphasis on meekness. Meekness is sometimes difficult to understand because it is confused with weakness or timidity. However, meekness enables a person to do good in response to evil. While it may seem more natural to be angry when one is assaulted in some way, meekness allows one to take the higher road.

Perhaps meekness is best exemplified in the passion and death of Jesus. While hanging on a cross, Jesus' response to the pain and taunting is, "Father forgive them." He does not allow adversity to overcome him but instead takes self-possession of the situation.

Often we are presented with stories where tragic actions by a person or group are responded to with forgiveness and respect. Classic examples exist where prisoners and perpetrators forgave those who hurt them. Such circumstances remind us of the goodness that exists in people when they strive to live the third Beatitude.

As we begin a new month, let us take possession of ourselves in the difficult situations that may come to us. Let us pray and practice to be in control of our emotions and reactions rather than the reverse. In such ways we can become blessed by the Lord, for we will have taken the higher road.

Pre-employment Drug Screen Requirement - Suspended

Our drug screening provider is undergoing a merger and we are having difficulty obtaining a new agreement and process and the cost is expected to be higher. They now have no locations outside of New Castle County, DE.

Because of this, for the foreseeable future, we are suspending the pre-employment drug screen requirement until we can secure a new vendor/process. The Human Resources Office will keep you updated on this information.

Office of Child Care Licensing – Delaware

There are no updates at this time in the ongoing negotiations with the Office of Child Care Licensing in Delaware regarding Catholic and private school requirements to be met by July 2024. At the recent meeting of the Delaware Association of Independent Schools (DAIS), Joe Fitzgerald, lobbyist, and David Kubacki, DAIS Executive Director, reported that they continue to work with the OCCL and state legislators to address school concerns. It is expected that additional information will be available in November.

Clearly this situation is very frustrating to school administrators. Please be patient until some sort of confirmation has been received regarding next steps.

Lesson Targets (Objectives)

In his book, *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*, Stephen Covey focuses on timeless principles of fairness, integrity, honesty, and human dignity. One of the most compelling books ever written, *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*, has empowered and inspired readers for over 30 years.

Habit #2 is "Begin with the End in Mind." Put simply, define clear measures of success and a plan to achieve them. While such a habit is valuable in life, it is equally important in classroom instruction. As teachers, we must know what our lesson goal is, communicate it to students, and check that they have accomplished it.

This habit of presenting a lesson target or objective, verbally and visually, to students in language they understand provides them with the "end in mind." They know where they should be going in the lesson, even if they don't reach the destination by the lesson's end. With a clear target presented at the start of a lesson, the entire body of instruction with all its strategies develops the target. At the conclusion of the lesson, formative assessment of some sort – a question, a summary statement, an exit ticket, a key word – circles back to see that the target has been reached or that further instruction may be necessary.

Consistency in practice will teach students to listen and look for the target each day. Monitoring instruction will assist teachers to include the target each day. The end result will be more effective teaching and learning.
