Pause and Ponder

Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

We begin October with a focus on the second Beatitude. How reassured we are by this Beatitude in knowing that sin, suffering, sickness, and death – all elements of the human condition – will be overcome by the compassion of Jesus toward us. Despite what circumstances may bring our way, our fidelity to the Lord will allow us to find forgiveness, peace, healing, and eternal life in Him.

While we look to the Lord to comfort us now and in the future, we also bear responsibility to bring compassion to others by our words and actions. The Lord works with and through us to be His instrument of comfort to those in distress.

At times, we may be reluctant in moving toward another in that person's time of challenge or sorrow. We may think we do not have the words or the actions to comfort the depth of mourning the other person is experiencing. At these moments look to Jesus who has taught us the importance of presence. He has modeled for us the value of simply being there with another, when the other person needs someone to lean on. In a similar way, we may live this Beatitude by simply being present to the person in need. Our willingness to be with another may be not just the only, but perhaps the greatest gift, we can give to ease someone's pain or sorrow.



A number of elementary schools utilize Scholastic Book Fairs as a school fundraiser. Some publications sold by Scholastic at book fairs are not in line with Catholic teaching. Therefore, if a school uses Scholastic Book Fairs, it is important that the books available for purchase be examined to ensure that they align with what the Catholic school believes and teaches. Books that discuss themes in conflict with Church teaching should be removed from the display cases and returned to Scholastic.

Elementary teachers often encourage students to purchase books from Scholastic throughout the school year. Parents should be informed about the importance of reviewing the content of the selected books so that it is appropriate to what they wish their children to read.

identiGo - New Fingerprint System in Delaware

The following information provides the instructions for the new fingerprint system through a vender call identiGO that is being used by the Delaware State Police. The following steps must be taken to schedule an appointment:

- 1. Go to dsp.delaware.gov.
- 2. Scroll down to the Featured Services section and click on the fingerprints & backgrounds section.
- 3. Scroll down to Schedule an Appointment and click on https://uenroll.identigo.com.
- 4. Scroll down and click on Manage an existing Appointment.
- 5. The Manage Appointment page will appear. Complete all of the information that are required fields. You will be asked what form of identification you will use at the time of your appointment. Whatever you chose, you must bring that form of identification to your appointment.
- 6. You will then get to a page where you are asked to schedule an appointment. There are 9 locations where this can be done and various dates and times for an appointment.
- 7. Once you have scheduled an appointment, a receipt will be sent to the email with a user ID number. Bring that receipt to your appointment.
- 8. Be prepared to pay for this service at the time of your appointment. No cash will be accepted. You can pay with a business check, money order or a credit card (Visa, Master Card, Discover, or American express. NOTE Your name must be the name on the credit card for it to be accepted as a method of payment.
- 9. The results of the Criminal History check will be sent to you.
- 10. You must then send a copy of the Criminal History results via email to Michael Connelly, Diocesan Director of the Office of Safe Environments, at mconnelly@cdow.org. In the email, identify the school where you are working. A clearance certificate will then be sent to the school.
